## POLICY STATEMENT

Final exams must be cumulative and account for at least 40 percent of the final grade for courses and units longer than 3 weeks, and 70-85% for units lasting 3 weeks or less.

#### SCOPE

This policy applies to all Academic Year 1 and 2 courses except for courses in the Medicine and Society Strand and the Professional Development Strand.

## **Procedure: Final Exams**

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#### PROCEDURE STATEMENT

- A. All courses counting towards the GPA should have a final exam.
  - Final exams are cumulative.
  - The course director (CD) for longitudinal courses and unit director (UD) for units is responsible for determining the type of exam, finalizing exams, mapping/tagging exams, submitting exams for review, and addressing all recommendations.
- B. Types of final exams:
  - Multiple-choice question (MCQ) exams may be selected from the National Board of Medical Examiners (NBME) or be internally developed by the course faculty.
  - All courses from the Human Biology and Disease strand must include at least one other non MCQ exam, i.e., a critical thinking exam (CTE) for foundation courses, and diagnostic reasoning exam (DXR) for organ system courses.
  - Clinical skill courses must include an Objective Structured Clinical Examination (OSCE).



- C. Weight distribution for final exams:
  - During the syllabus review process, the Assistant Dean for Foundational Education ensures that the weight of final exams should be more than 40% of the final grade for units/courses longer than 3 weeks, and 70-85% for units 3 weeks or less.
- D. Compliance with this policy is reviewed during the syllabus review process by the Foundational Education Subcommittee. The Assessment Subcommittee also reviews weight distribution and may provide recommendations to CDs and UDs.
